San Bernardino County has an MMR vaccination rate of 93.7% for kindergarteners, which is below the state average of 96.1%, with some schools as low as 14.6%. Clinicians should prioritize vaccinations to achieve herd immunity and establish airborne precautions for patients showing measles symptoms to prevent exposure.

MMR Vaccination Recommendations	
Children	Adults
<p>Routine Vaccination:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">○ 1st dose: 12–15 months○ 2nd dose: 4–6 years (can be given 28 days after 1st dose) <p>Vaccine Options:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">○ MMR or MMRV (measles/mumps/rubella/varicella)○ Separate MMR and varicella recommended for ages 12–47 months <p>MMRV 2nd Dose:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">○ At least 3 months after 1st dose, allowed up to 12 years <p>Travel Recommendations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">○ Vaccinate 2-3 weeks before travel○ Infants 6-11 months: 1 early MMR dose (not part of routine series)○ Children 12 months+: complete 2-dose series (4 weeks apart)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Should have 1 or 2 doses unless there's presumptive immunity (e.g., documented vaccinations or past infection).• No need for routine screening in non-outbreak areas.• No catch-up second dose recommended for adults born before 1989.

Measles testing should involve nasopharyngeal swabs and urine specimens, and suspected cases must be reported to the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health.
